



SPOTLIGHT ON YOUNG RIDERS: 2022 NORTH AMERICAN CHILDREN'S JUMPER CHAMPIONSHIP

On August 11th, Traverse City, Michigan hosted the North American Youth Championships (NAYC) to showcase the talents of the best Junior and Child riders on the continent. This year, the Canadian Children's Jumping Team of Mathilde Candele, Livia Martin, Taylor Wood, Tristan Tobin and reserve rider Ashlynn Crowley captured the gold medal in an exciting two rounds and jump-off. All members of the OHJA, these riders worked together as a team to represent Canada. After Canada went double clear with three scores in the first two rounds, they competed in a jump-off against United States Zone 2 for the first place finish. As these gifted young riders took to the podium and wore their gold medals with pride, they credited international opportunities to promote and develop excellence in our sport. New this year, the OHJA offered all athletes a bursary of \$1000 to help these young riders achieve their international goals.

1. How did you prepare for the North American Youth Championship?

Mathilde Candele: I began showing my horse Disco, this winter in Wellington, Florida at WEF in the low junior jumper (1.20m) division because I knew that if I wanted to go to NAYC we would have to be consistent at this level. It was good preparation because the Sunday classics are a full 1.25m and the courses are pretty challenging. When we got home to Canada we jumped a few 1.30m classes to prepare for the height at NAYC and at home we practiced triples, triple bars and gymnastics. We made sure Disco was fit enough for a championship format, but at the same time had to make sure he still had enough rest and paddock time.

Livia Martin: This is my second year competing at the NAYC so we had a better idea of what to expect both in the format and the level of competition. Leading up to it this year I competed in classes higher than I would be at the NAYC. We jump a lot of rounds during the event so we really focused on making sure my horse, Coradi, was in his best physical and mental condition going in to the competition.

Taylor Wood: Prior to NAYC, I spent lots of time in the saddle working with my trainers, Ian and Amy Millar who helped me learn and grow with my horses to be successful at the championships and in the future. The competition was on our mind months before it actually happened. I spent lots of time in Wellington, Florida and later on the eastern Canadian show circuit with my horse JoyRide, who came to the Championships with me this year. We competed in the 1.20m, 1.25m and even conquered our first 1.30m together. He felt ready for NAYC. I'm also on the Ontario equestrian GRIT team, a program that gives young riders from Ontario opportunities to develop strength and conditioning sessions which helped me prepare and do my best.

Ashlynn Crowley: Because I had a new partnership with a young horse, preparing for NAYC was all about getting time in the ring to learn about each other and to continue to develop her. She is only seven, so allowing her to see many different locations and types of jumps was our plan before NAYC. We showed at five different venues to give her that exposure. We also arranged for some dressage lessons to ensure my young horse was continuing her development as a jumper. The other thing I did to prepare was to talk to people who had been to Young Riders before. This was my first time going, so I didn't know what to expect. I was lucky that both my coaches Carly Campbell-Cooper and John Jamieson had both participated in Young Riders, and they could help me focus on my skills without being nervous.

2. What were your highlights from the event?

Matilde Candele: There were lots of highlights. Winning a gold medal, of course! But also meeting the other riders and the friendships I made with my teammates. Riding on a team is a different experience than riding as an individual and it was an honor to be able to do it while representing Canada.

Livia Martin: Two highlights were standing on the podium listening to the Canadian anthem being played with not only my teammates but my friends and celebrating afterwards with my teammates, friends and family.

Taylor Wood: My team and I winning gold in the Children's Team Event was definitely a huge highlight of the competition. We all went out and tried our best and this time it paid off. It couldn't have been a better day! I was also so proud of JoyRide's performance all week! He's come such a long way in the time that I've had him and he tried his best every time we went into the ring. Watching the other age groups compete and spending time with my team out of the saddle was a lot of fun as well!

Ashlynn Crowley: Watching my teammates win the GOLD medal was really special. I was very happy for them all. As the reserve rider, I didn't get a medal but I still felt proud of what our team accomplished. My results were good, so coming out of Young Riders, I was asked to step up and join the team at the European Championships in Peelburgen. I learned that it is important never to quit, even if you go into a competition as the underdog you can come out with greater opportunities. My horse also won an award during the FEI jog for the best turned out horse, so it was neat that she was recognized too.

3. Riding as a team might have been a new experience for you. How did you work as a team together to win gold?

Matilde Candele: Competing as a team was a new experience for me. Every time I jumped in the ring, it was not just for me, it was for all of us on the team- and for Canada! I definitely felt the pressure to do well but knowing my teammates supported my performance as much as their own and that we all had the same goal, made me feel like we could win a medal. It was amazing to win a gold medal but even better that I had teammates that shared that moment with me.

Livia Martin: We were really lucky this year because a few of us knew each other before and were already friends. By the end of our first day of all meeting, we just “clicked”. We all supported and encouraged each other so when we won the gold it made it even better.

Taylor Wood: Although it wasn’t a new experience for me as I had the opportunity to be on the team in 2021, I loved being on the team this year. My teammates and I spent basically the whole week together, watching, learning, and of course having fun. We all built each other up, supported one another, and wanted to do our best for our team. We certainly had strong team spirit going into the event!

Ashlynn Crowley: The team format was a new one, and I think the most important thing that our team did was to spend lots of time bonding as a team. We had a group chat in advance of the competition and then spent a lot of time together as soon as we got to the event. The Children’s Team was a really great group and although we had competed against each other before we didn’t really know each other very well but I think now we will be friends forever.

4. What are your goals for the future?

Matilde Candele: Short term I want to jump in a Grand Prix. Long term- Olympic gold.

Livia Martin: My short term goals are to put in consistent confident rides for my horses in the med/high Junior jumper. My long term goals are to successfully move up and compete at the highest levels representing Canada.

Taylor Wood: Youth championships 2023 is definitely a short term goal of mine. I would love to be a part of the team every year if given the opportunity! The U25's and big Grand Prix's are also milestones I'd like to achieve, and competing at the Olympics and at the big Nations Cups as part of Team Canada is definitely a dream, although far in the future!

Ashlynn Crowley: I have had the chance to compete at the international level three times now and would like to do this even more in the future. Getting back to NAYC

and getting to other large events like this are absolutely part of my goals. I would also like to work towards Grand Prix competitions. I loved the chance to represent Canada in a Nations Cup type format, so maybe someday I can do this at WEG or even the Olympics. I also have a hunter that I compete with and am anxious to do some of the larger derbies and other hunter events.

5. How can the sport continue to support the development of young riders?

Matilde Candele: Continuing to support events like NAYC is really important because it gives young riders the exposure to the kind of competition that we will face if we want to compete at the highest level internationally. The different heights at NAYC gives riders at different levels the same opportunity to compete and to represent Canada at an international event. If we can get the experience when we are young at a level we are comfortable jumping, we will be better prepared to compete at the high level in the future.

Livia Martin: As everyone knows, this sport is very expensive. I think funding and programming to help promote riders who might not necessarily be able to do it on their own is very helpful. I also think setting up some team competitions throughout the year would be great. You're not just riding for yourself, you're riding for your team. It is also a lot of fun having teammates and working together.

Taylor Wood: Giving young riders more opportunities to compete at high quality, challenging events like the North American Youth Championships would definitely continue to support young riders on their equestrian journeys. We can't grow without experience.

Ashlynn Crowley: I think there is lots that can be done to support young riders who are committed to this level of competition. I think new learning opportunities and getting to attend and participate in bigger competitions will help riders like me be prepared for the future. I also think that it is important to have competitions for Junior Riders even at the lower heights. There are so many ways that the industry can support young riders and I think the more support that young riders receive now, the more prepared we will be when we get the next big opportunity to ride for Canada.

There are many highlights from USEF Pony Finals 2022, but if I had to pick one, it would be walking down the chute leading me into the Rolex Stadium to do my over fences class. This was my first year competing at Pony Finals, and it felt amazing to have a goal of mine actualized.

A learning experience from Pony Finals.

A learning experience from USEF Pony Finals 2022 was the Model Clinic that took place the morning of my first day of showing. It was a learning experience because of the opportunity to learn from professional model clinicians and judges. We learned how to properly stand up your

pony and jog them in-hand, all while showing off your pony's best features.

Importance of International competitions for Canadian Junior Riders.

It is important to have experience/exposure at international competitions like USEF Pony Finals because it teaches you to control your emotions under pressure. At Pony Finals, you get only one class over fences, meaning like a Grand Prix rider, you only have one round to go clear. Pony Finals helps to mentally prepare you for the pressure of big-time competitions, as well as showcase your talents against a bigger field of riders. Competing at USEF Pony Finals allowed me to return to Ontario and successfully compete

One of my goals was to go to Pony Finals at least once in my pony career. I showed Kira in mid-December and her first time out, she qualified! One of my goals at Pony Finals was just to have fun. I knew that the entry numbers would be big, so I didn't expect to place. My highlight of Pony Finals was placing in the top 5, out of nearly 100 ponies in the hack, as well finishing 17th overall with a 20th over fences. Not only was the show amazing, the huge fields were some of my favourite places to ride. I am very thankful that I was able to experience this show and I don't think it could have gone any better.

- JULIA MACANGUS

It is with deepest sorrow that we share the passing of one of our young OHJA members, Julia MacAngus, in November 2022. Julia's passion for life and extraordinary kindness defined who she was and she leaves an incredible legacy behind for those who knew her. Julia's story touched so many of us and, as a result, we wanted to share it with all of you.

Julia's passion and dedication to the equestrian community, her horses and clients was unwavering. At the young age of 21, her passion propelled her to start her own competitive hunter/jumper business under the banner of JM Equestrian. As Head Trainer, Julia quickly built a solid reputation as an honest, dedicated, knowledgeable trainer and coach and her business flourished while also realizing one of her lifelong dreams. Her other dream was to be a member of the Canadian Olympic Equestrian Team.

Then the unthinkable happened. In October 2021, at the tender age of 22, Julia, was diagnosed with Grade 4 Glioblastoma, a fast growing and aggressive brain tumor. She underwent intense treatments to manage her pain and slow the progression of the disease. She experienced significant side effects such that her vision was impaired but the cancer continued to spread to her spine. Despite the enormous toll this took on Julia, cancer didn't beat her; she insisted on continuing her undeniable passion to work and wore a smile on her face each and every day. Caring for and training multiple horses, teaching her clients, riding her own and others' horses and competing at horse shows gave Julia the motivation and strength she needed to deal with this awful disease. Through it all, Julia's positivity and strength were inspirational. While she had lots to be angry about, instead she was grateful for everything in her life: her supportive family, her extended barn families and friends, her horses and her beloved dog Bear.

Julia managed to take on the 2022 show season with much success for herself and her clients driven by her positivity, courage and grit. She wrapped the season with a big win in her Jumper division despite the devastating impairments from the unrelenting tumor that her treatments had dealt her. The huge smile on her face said it all and her whole team rallied around her sharing in this magical moment.

Sadly, a few weeks later, Julia's condition worsened and she ended up in Palliative care where she succumbed to this terrible awful disease. Julia's legacy will live on through a memorial trophy and prize in her name, the Julia MacAngus Memorial trophy, to be awarded annually to a young rider in the Ottawa area who exemplifies the same exceptional qualities as this beautiful young lady – unwavering dedication, passion, kindness and gratitude.

I want to thank Julia's parents, John MacAngus and Shirley Fleming for helping us tell Julia's story and giving us the opportunity to know a very special woman in our sport.

OHJA Young Hunter Development Final

The OHJA Young Hunter Development is a relatively new format of hunter classes being offered for Young Hunters between the ages of 3 and 5 on the Ontario Gold circuit. Formerly the OHJA Ultimate Hunter, the OHJA decided to revamp their support of Young Hunters in 2018. The Ultimate Hunter was only one show and the support for the Ultimate Hunter was waning and the OHJA saw that it was time for a change. The OHJA believed that there was still a need to create classes that encouraged and supported owners and trainers of young horses being developed

for the hunter ring. The current classes are offered at multiple venues in Ontario and later in the summer schedule to maximize participation of young hunters making their debut. This summer in particular saw great participation with the Model class at The International at Caledon Equestrian Park having 24 entries!

This series also has great support and partnership with the Canadian Sport Horse Association. They provide a beautiful wool cooler and wonderful prizes for the Champion and Reserve Champions respectively. There are some incredible breeding programs right here in Canada and locally in Ontario. This series is

showcasing these lovely horses and their breeders. The OHJA makes a point of highlighting the breeding of each winner.

We aimed my 5-year-old KWPN gelding Atticus Finch at these classes and made a plan to participate at the shows offering this OHJA program that were local to us. Our preparation included working at home on the ground and practicing standing up and jogging. We don't really have confirmation classes at the Ontario Gold shows so there isn't much opportunity to practice these elements. I really appreciated that there was prize money which is not offered in the Baby Green Division. These classes also give an opportunity for Breeders and hunter breeding to be celebrated. It takes a lot to get a young horse to the ring and Breeders put their heart and soul into creating these matches and raising these horses. My horse was

bred in Quebec by Elevage Fournier and many of the winners this summer were bred here in Canada.

These classes are a great way to get a young horse out to an Ontario Gold show. You don't have to do all 3 classes and can enter each individually. This allows you to participate at the appropriate level of where your young horse is in its development. Also, the over fences class is only 2'3" which means you won't impact your Baby Green status if you participate in the over fences class. It is also offered at 3 different venues so gives owners an opportunity to show at different facilities and/or choose venues that are close to them. I was grateful to be able to participate with my young hunter in these classes and thank the OHJA, the CSHA and the supporting venues for offering these classes.

CANADIAN HUNTER DERBY SERIES



Lorna Guthrie (pictured here in 1962 over a 4' split rail jump) enjoyed a long and storied career as a hunter rider.

Pre-Derby

Lorna Guthrie developed and sponsored the \$2,500 Knightwood Hunter Derby in 1998, years before the explosion of derbies in the US.

The event was co-sponsored by the OHJA. It was a take your own line format and included banks, picnic tables and the option of jumping out of the ring to finish your round.

Teaming up with Willa Gauthier and her Rip Gauthier Classic, founded in 2003, a high point championship in the two events, called The Kindred Cup.

Rip Gauthier and Lorna's husband, Hugh, along with Mark Samuels were the founding members of the OHJA.

The Canadian Hunter Series

Building on the success of the Kindred Cup Series, The Canadian Hunter Derby was founded in 2010.

The goal of the Derby is to create more spectator, sponsor, owner and competitor excitement with the hunter divisions. The Hunter Derby provides an opportunity for hunter riders to take center stage in a grand prix environment and show case the high-performance capabilities of horse and rider.

It is a unique Canadian one round format, rewarding high performance and handiness right from the start. Competitors earn a base hunter score, a ten- point bonus for high options jumped (5 jumps x 2 points each) and up to a ten-point handy bonus.

The Jr/Amateur Hunter Classic is usually run over the same jumps without high options and handiness and has been a great way to introduce riders to the derby.

In the early days of the Derby most events were on grass including natural permanent jumps including banks, grabs, ditches, even a liver pool or two.

2022

The 2022 Derby season featured \$500,000 in prize money and over 60 nation-wide events. The 10th anniversary of the Canadian Hunter Derby National Championships at the Royal coincided with the Royal 100th anniversary.



Equestrian Canada sponsored travel bonuses to the top five horses in the West Derby standings to ensure the best-of-the-best are competing for the National Derby Championship.

The Derby sponsors are critical to the success of the Derby Series.

Horse Shows in Ontario

At the heart of the Canadian Hunter Derby Series are the horse shows who do most of the heavy lifting in building the series, ensure derby jumps are available, self sponsor prize money and recruit derby sponsors.

Years before the Canadian Hunter Derby Series, Ottawa ran a very popular hunter classic on their beautiful grass grand prix field and became one of the foundational events in the series. Ottawa offers top prize money to attract the biggest fields in the country and there is no better feeling than galloping across the Ottawa grand prix field towards a big jump!

Angelstone played a huge role in building the sport with derbies every week and over \$150,000 of derby prize money in 2022 at

both venues. Angelstone has hosted every Ontario and East Derby Championship from the beginning of the derby series. They continue to be leaders in number of events and total series prize money.

Derby Sponsorship

Sponsorship is critical to the success of the Canadian Hunter Derby Series. The jump sponsors fund the construction, maintenance
